This session followed staff training earlier in the week where staff were tested on our knowledge of the dangers of vapes and Insight gave us advice on how best to approach conversations with our students. Weekly Roundup

We started the week feeling the cold and wet and ended it bathed in blossom and sunshine - what a difference a week makes! The change in the weather always has a significant impact on our students. Although the field is still waterlogged, they have greater access to the hard courts and Y7 have the run of the area behind the Science block. Being able to spend both break and lunch times outside generally lifts everybody's spirits and allows our students to enjoy the benefits of our site. This has also fed into our review of the new school day and the allocation of key stage wings. Having a shorter afternoon works well with a more physically active lunchtime and the ability of the younger year groups to have their own areas supports their confidence. The last couple of days have given us a glimpse of the Summer Term and we are looking forward to seeing our students making the most of our site.

The improved weather also enabled some of our House activities this week. Students from Franklin House were out and about selling raffle tickets to raise money for the West London Rape Crisis Centre under the guidance of their Head of House, Ms Jones. Ms Jones also led the Pi-reciting competition yesterday - we will leave it to her to explain the drama and exciting (and awe-inspiring!) outcome of the competition in Ms Jones' report in this Newsletter. The Houses continue to offer many unusual and interesting ways for students to get involved with the life of the school. We would encourage as many students as possible to participate in the activities on offer as the experiences enrich and enliven the school experience for those who take part. As today is Red Nose Day, it is great to see students getting involved in fun fundraising activities.

During the week we hosted an evening on-line event for parents and carers from Insight on the significant issue of vapes. Ms Sullivan has supplied information on the first page. Events like this are an important way for us to share information and to establish ways of working with our parents and carers. Staff received information from the same team last week and for many of those present, the information was alarming. Not everyone had realised the extent of the potential danger of vapes. We will continue to send this message to our students without being alarmist and we value the part played by our families in talking to their sons and daughters and supporting the school in our response to vaping, including the use of random bag searches.

As is customary at school, we will be packing in as much as possible before the end of term. Next week sees both guidance meetings for Y11, when every student will have a conversation about their plans post-16 with either a member of the Y11 Team, our Careers' Advisor or a member of the SLT. To keep us busy we are also photographing years 7-11 next Tuesday (see above). Ms Brooks organises the day with military precision but as always when dealing with young people, we're sure there will be a few surprises!

Last week we wrote about World Book Day. Readings have continued this week and Ms Davey was surprised (and pleased!) when reading to a Y7 group this week how interested the students are in the past history of Fortismere. As you know, this year marks our 40th anniversary and we will be celebrating with a range of activities. Given the interest in our past, we will explore with our students how they would like to commemorate the history of this school and its predecessors and let you know. We may also be seeking out some of the alumni who we know make up part of our parent body....

World Book Day Week(s) in the Library

We finished our World Book Day Week(s) celebrations on Friday after another week of SLT and other members of staff coming in to talk in our library lessons. Mr Kenny described books as "the original internet but better" and introduced the students to the delights of Ursula le Guin's Earthsea books. Ms Judge remembers loving Judy Blume books for their wonderful renditions of growing up, friendship, family, puberty









and constant blushing— *Are You There, God? It's Me, Margaret* went down well. Mr Robson said books make you feel good and keep you healthy in the same way that going for a run and eating well do, reading tasters from *Doughnut Economics* and *Lessons in Chemistry*. Ms Jackson took Year 8s back to their early childhood with Oliver Jeffer's picturebook *The Day the Crayons Quit*. Mr Rainey lost a teddy bear book from his village mobile library and was so terrified of the librarian that he never returned! We loved hearing about books he's read and how much he has learned and been influenced by them.

Mr Allen took us from *Hairy McClary* (from Donaldson's Dairy...) through *Just William*, *Watership Down* and *The Hobbit* and finished a highly entertaining session with that gorgeous passage from 1 Corinthians, *Love is patient and kind*... Every year Ms Brooks shares fabulous books from her bookshelves, and this year was no exception. She read from Daisy Ashford's *The Young Visiters* (sic), first published in 1919 when the author was 9 years old and reprinted 18 times that year. She also extolled the virtues of graphic novels, showing the students one that was illustrated by Isabel Greenberg, a Fortismere alumnus. Mr Ward loved the blood and gore in *The Legend of Drizzt* books when he was a teenager (things don't change!) and, complete with handouts, read from and talked about the fantasy world-building of the Forgotten Realms. Ms Fox's life in three books - *Where the Wild Things Are*, *The Little House on the Prairie* and *Jane Eyre* was a good lesson in the power of transformation and how you can change to be anything you want to be. It's been a great fortnight of library lessons – students have also been offered the WBD vouchers and free books!
