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

Happy International Women's Day to you all! We are fortunate at Fortismere that we have an active and inspirational FEMSOC (Feminist Society) who for quite a number of years have taken the lead in organising our International Women's Day event. It's one of our favourite events as we always leave moved, excited and inspired by the speeches and performances and this year was no exception. We are fortunate to have quite a unique level of musical talent at Fortismere and it was wonderful to hear our performers entertain us with musical covers alongside some beautiful compositions but also this year we were delighted to welcome back three Fortismere Alumni who were able to share their experiences: Eve Wersocki-Morris a celebrated children's author, Millie Newmarch a designer and Lilah Hyman from the Charity 'Women for Refugee Women' (The charity that all of the evening's proceeds will go to). We had contributions from our wider community including a parent, Rachel Morris who spoke engagingly about her career as a female engineer and Nancy Collins, a human rights lawyer who delivered some sobering stories about female clients who had suffered institutional abuse. Our audience gained a real sense of how women in our community have gone on to make a striking difference to the world. It was a truly special evening and we would like to extend our thanks and congratulations to Year 13 students and FEMSOC leads Sian Flannigan, Freya Bielby, Laney Harris and Lucy Hawkes who showed outstanding leadership and vision in putting together the event.

Year 13 were also treated to a visit from another strong woman this week as their Assembly was led by our local MP Catherine West. Catherine is a great supporter of Fortismere events. This week she came to talk to students about voting and the importance of using your voice when you have an opportunity. Many of our Year 13 students (if not all of them depending on when the general election takes place) will have the opportunity to cast their votes at the ballot box very soon . We were heartened by the fact that the group of Year 13 students who told us about the assembly all stated that they intended to use their vote. Our sixth form students will be given a number of opportunities this year to consider the forthcoming election with input from across the political spectrum.

It has in fact been a week of national events. Yesterday was World Book Day and today is World Maths Day. As is customary for World Book Day we have, alongside other members of staff, been to visit Year 7 and 8 students in their library lessons to read to them and share our personal literary favourites. It's a pleasure to share with our students the vital role reading has played in our lives and as always they were such great listeners. To celebrate World Maths Day we urge all of our students to prioritise their Maths homework this weekend!

The evenings are getting much brighter and the Fortismere daffodils are in bloom. We are edging towards Spring. Whatever the weather does this weekend we hope you are all able to enjoy a rest.

St Edmund Hall Oxford - 'Big Think' competition Y11-Y13

St Edmund Hall are running their annual 'Big Think' competition for UK state school pupils in Years 11-13. The questions have been specially designed to challenge students beyond their normal school curriculum and get them thinking 'big' about their subject and what it might be like to study it at university. Top Tip No: 20 Don't panic if your child reads the same book over and over again. Let's be honest - we've all done it!

World Book Day Week(s) in the Library

Thursday 7th March was World Book Day! Although we don't dress up at Fortismere (Mrs Ward's costume of choice would be Miss Trunchbull...) we still celebrate during the two weeks either side of the big day by inviting senior members of staff in to talk to students about their "reading journeys" and to prove that it's not just librarians who read books!

Ms Davey shared her love of the school library (Fortismere's library used to be in North Wing where the nursery is now) and detective stories and read to us from Murder Most Unladylike by Robin Stevens. Ms De Freitas took us on a trip through some of her favourite books – Goodnight Mr Tom (Michelle Magorian), The Hunger Games (Suzanne Collins), I May BetrayYou (Ruta Sepetys), All Quiet on the Western Front (Erich Maria Remarque), My Brilliant Friend (Elena Ferrante) and more.





We had some fascinating non-fiction from Mr Lewis with Charlie English's The Book Smugglers of Timbuktu – how archivists and librarians fought to save the city's ancient manuscripts from destruction at the hands of al Qaeda. Mr Hann steered us along the physics (and sci-fi) path from Dr Who to Bill Bryson and delighted us with some grisly gossip about Isaac Newton who was also, it turns out, a big bully (ask his "friend" Robert Hooke).





We heard about The Borribles, a rebellious community of small London outcasts (Michael di Larrabeiti) from Mr Watson who described how, as a child, he'd try to emulate their antics, catapults and all. Mr Fari talked about dyslexia and especially how audiobooks are a great way into the marvellous world of stories – we then had great fun listening to one of the opening chapters of Harry Potter (where the boa constrictor escapes)!





Author Visit

We are really privileged to have Dan Freedman as Fortismere's Patron of Reading – his sessions with our Year 7s have been interactive and engaging and we were lucky that he was able to fit in a visit to our library on Tuesday 5th March in between work with Liverpool Football Academy and Arsenal as well as trips to Devon during this World Book Day Week. He always has to remind our students (who ask every time what team he supports) that in his profession he has to remain neutral, but he always admits that his heart lies with AFC Ajax - perhaps only so he can show them his favourite goal of all time - watch it here. visit he was interviewed by members of our Press Gang student newspaper team, so look out for the article in the next edition.

There will also be plenty for adults, including big names like Natalie Haynes, Robin Ince, Costa-winner Stuart Turton, Erin Kelly, Jane Fallon and Peter Hain - but also some exciting debut writers including Leo Vardiashvili who featured on Front Row recently, Nadeine Asbali who will talk about her book Veiled Threat, a sharp and illuminating examination of what it is to be a

visibly Muslim woman in modern Britain, and Jay Owens with Dust: The Modern World in a Trillion Particles, revealing the hidden consequences of environmental devastation caused by the relentless pursuit of profit and power. There will be panels ranging from conversations with parenting experts, to an exploration of creativity and AI with Robin Ince and Andy Stanton, to Kevin Morosky's conversation with Kelechi Okafor and other contributors to his book Black Women Always, plus a Night of Crime and Thrillers and workshops for children. 














Sport & PE Notices
