School Leadership Messages

Smartphones in the News

Mrs Ghey, the mother of murdered teenager Brianna, has rekindled the debate about the use of smartphones by younger teens. She has drawn attention to the ubiquity of social media and the challenge to parents and carers in effectively policing content. Other parent groups have joined the debate and are calling for age restrictions on access to social media sites and for some groups, a minimum age for ownership of a smartphone. This follows on from a UN report from the summer calling for a ban on smartphones in schools.

At Fortismere we have a mobile phone policy that allows non-smart phones to be switched off at the bottom of bags for Years 7-11. However, phones that have cameras and internet access are not allowed. This protects our students from viewing harmful content, online bullying and illicit photograph or video taking during the school day. This supports our safeguarding in keeping school a safe space. We have noticed this year that there has been a rise in students bringing their smartphones onsite for which we will continue to conduct random searches. Please could we ask that you respect our policy and work with us in keeping your children as safe as possible.

In keeping with Fortismere's usual approach to the week before a holiday, this week was incredibly busy with a range of exciting events and activities.

On Tuesday, we were proud to host the regional (Haringey) final for the Jack Petchey Speak Challenge. Just like Eurovision, the winners of the previous year's tournament get to host the next one. We were very impressed by the organisation of the Speakers Trust and their Jack Petchey colleagues. The event went like clockwork and the South Wing Hall was transformed. A number of schools from across the borough had Y10 students competing and the quality of the speeches was superb. These students, including Fortismere's own three competitors, were deeply engaged with current issues and articulated their concerns and solutions with confidence and accuracy. Often the discourse around young people in Haringey focuses on knife crime and anti-social behaviour. It was heartening to hear of these students' aspirations and hopes for the future. The event created an atmosphere of optimism for the future and a reassurance of the resilience, ambition and engagement of our local young people. Thank you to Mr Allen for his part in the proceedings and the time he dedicates to working with our Y10 students in preparation for Speak Out.

We had two parent events this week, starting with Y9 Options Guidance meetings on Tuesday. These were a hybrid mixture of remote and face to face and we were delighted by the number of parents and carers who could attend and the interest shown in our curriculum. We look forward to seeing the option choices after half term. On Wednesday, Y11 parents and carers were invited in for Y11 Parents' Evening. For some parents, this was their last parents evening and it was lovely to catch up with parents we have known over the years. We received some very kind and thoughtful comments, thank you to all those who could attend.

Yesterday evening saw the Charity Bands Night. This is organised by the 6th form and last night's was organised and compered by Lizzie Wells and Aaron Franks in Y13, raising funds for Crisis. The quality of the music was, as ever, excellent. We covered soul, heavy metal, musical theatre, pop and performers' own compositions - an eclectic mix! The performers spanned the age range including the father of a member of staff and the staff band, 'Cover Lesson'. We were impressed that Cover Lesson managed to reference both paninis and tuna melts in their first track, a homage to our canteens. The event raised in excess of £2,000 and the audience was treated to a very moving talk from Matt Downie MBE, the Chief Executive of Crisis who placed the fund raiser in the context of the growing need caused by homelessness.

It wasn't only parents and evening events this week. We had three activities led by houses: a University Challenge competition, the sale of pancakes for Cancer Research and the delivery of roses for Valentine's Day. The House system is going from strength to strength and it is really pleasing to see so many of our students participating in our extra curricular events.

It has been a short half term but we suspect that most of us are ready for a break. We wish all our families a Happy Chinese New Year (one of our Co-Heads is a dragon!) and an excellent holiday.

The event was compered by Nik Fysekis (last year's Haringey Champion and current Y11). Nik did a superb job, presenting the event with charm and wit, completely at ease and speaking passionately about the opportunities that The Speaker's Trust have given him this year, visiting universities and learning about careers in politics. Ece Uckun (Y11) was last years' runner up so this time she acted as a judge, wonderfully representing the school as she confidently mingled with the other esteemed judges: writer and director Simon Josiffe; barrister Evie Snow; chief executive of the The Young Brent Foundation Christopher Murray and BBC news presenter Robin Brant. 


Recommended Reads of the Week





Children's Mental Health Week

Happy Children's Mental Health week! This week, to celebrate, our students have been spending their tutor times taking part in a wide variety of activities all themed around mental health. Students did a reciprocal reading session on neurodiversity and how that can affect mental health and then had a discussion around this. They explored what they could do to be good friends and classmates to their neurodiverse peers. Students had a pastoral curriculum session and also an assembly on anxiety and specifically social anxiety, to understand how that can present and what they can do to help themselves and their friends. And they even took part in an Inter House quiz all about mental health to see how much they know about the different conditions that can affect young people. On Thursday, I met with the mental health ambassadors to hear from them about the sorts of things that are worrying our young people. These conversations were really helpful and will inform the survey that I will be asking some students to complete to help us improve our mental health provision at Fortismere.

It's been a busy and thoughtful week and I hope that students have learned a little more about themselves and how they can not only look after themselves but also their friends moving forward. And I hope that they will have a restful half term filled with sleep, healthy but delicious food, exercise and fresh air and whatever else makes them happy!

Meet the Team....

This week we're introducing Mr Fari, Assistant Headteacher and our school SENDCo (Special Educational Needs & Disability Co-ordinator)

What inspired you to work with and support young people in schools? I always knew I wanted to work with people and in particular working to enable others to achieve. I had fantastic support at school and felt that I was encouraged to do well by adults who had a lot of time and care for me. I wasn't 100% sure I wanted to be a teacher but entered the profession when a great opportunity came up after university. I thought it would be rewarding and I would gain skills while I decided what I wanted to do. However, it quickly became clear that I loved it and couldn't leave!

What's the best thing about your Job? Seeing the improvements and progress young people make, particularly when there are barriers and challenges that make it difficult to see the path to individual success.

What would you like to share with the school community this week? In my role as SENCo, I often find myself offering support and advice to parents/carers who are keen but unsure how to support their child with learning needs and difficulties. They are often looking for ideas and strategies they can use at home to help children feel supported and encouraged. I thought it would be useful to share some resources with you:

I also wanted to share a poem I came across many years ago when I started my training to be a SENCo. It shared a parent's experience of coming to terms with their child's disability. It resonated with me and I wanted to share it with you. It is called *'Welcome to Holland'* and was written in 1987 by Emily Perl Kingsley who became an advocate for inclusion following the birth of her son, Jason, who had Down Syndrome:

Welcome to Holland

I am often asked to describe the experience of raising a child with a disability - to try to help people who have not shared that unique experience to understand it, to imagine how it would feel. It's like this...

When you're going to have a baby, it's like planning a fabulous vacation trip - to Italy. You buy a bunch of guide books and make your wonderful plans. The Coliseum. The Michelangelo David. The gondolas in Venice. You may learn some handy phrases in Italian. It's all very exciting.

After months of eager anticipation, the day finally arrives. You pack your bags and off you go. Several hours later, the plane lands. The stewardess comes in and says, "Welcome to Holland."

"Holland?!?" you say. "What do you mean Holland?? I signed up for Italy! I'm supposed to be in Italy. All my life I've dreamed of going to Italy."

But there's been a change in the flight plan. They've landed in Holland and there you must stay.

The important thing is that they haven't taken you to a horrible, disgusting, filthy place, full of pestilence, famine and disease. It's just a different place.

So you must go out and buy new guide books. And you must learn a whole new language. And you will meet a whole new group of people you would never have met.

It's just a different place. It's slower-paced than Italy, less flashy than Italy. But after you've been there for a while and you catch your breath, you look around.... and you begin to notice that Holland has windmills....and Holland has tulips. Holland even has Rembrandts.

But everyone you know is busy coming and going from Italy... and they're all bragging about what a wonderful time they had there. And for the rest of your life, you will say "Yes, that's where I was supposed to go. That's what I had planned."

And the pain of that will never, ever, ever, ever go away...because the loss of that dream is a very, very significant loss.

But...if you spend your life mourning the fact that you didn't get to Italy, you may never be free to enjoy the very special, the very lovely things... about Holland.

Reporting concerns - My Voice

We have set up a new system called **My Voice** for parents/carers and students to use to inform us of any safeguarding concerns they may have. We will no longer be using the safetalk@fortismere.org.uk email

If you want to report something please complete a form on My Voice - this is a short and easy form and can be accessed via this <u>link</u> or by the QR code. You can report your concerns anonymously but we do ask that you share as much information as you can to enable us to provide support to any student who may require it.



My Voice will be monitored during school time with limited monitoring during non-school time. If you are concerned about an immediate risk of harm to a child you should report it to Police or Social Services (<u>Haringey</u> / <u>Barnet</u>).

You can also speak to Ms Sullivan, the Designated Safeguarding Lead about any safeguarding matters or concerns or alternatively contact your child's Head of Year
