Dropping children off at school

Weekly Roundup

At Fortismere we are always keen to gather views from our parent community on the experiences their children have as students at our school. This week we are asking all of our parents and carers to take some time to feed back on the two key aspects of their child's experience by completing our Pastoral Provision survey and our Teaching and Learning questionnaire over the next couple of weeks.

Parents who have children in Year 8 or above will remember that we asked parents to complete an extensive survey last year on our pastoral provision as part of our Pastoral Review 2023. The feedback from our review was used to develop a number of improvements to our pastoral systems which we wrote to you all about in July. We explained that from September 2023, Year Groups in Years 7-11 would be led and supported by Heads of Year working in partnership with newly appointed Pastoral Support Managers. Our Pastoral Support Managers are non-teaching members of staff with a range of knowledge, experience and expertise in supporting young people in accessing their education. We also shared that we were increasing the time given to tutoring at Fortismere to allow our teams of tutors to provide the best holistic support for our learners to enable them to thrive at our school. Our Heads of Year and Pastoral Support Managers have been supporting tutors in setting the highest expectations with regards to student engagement. This has involved re-setting the culture at Fortismere around the importance of attendance and punctuality and programmes and systems that support all students to learn how to self manage and develop the optimum behaviours for study and self development. This letter was followed up by an online meeting in September that was led by us to relaunch our pastoral systems and can be viewed again <u>here</u>.

Since we are approaching the midpoint in the year we are keen to come back to you, our parent body, in order to hear your views again on a number of aspects of our Pastoral Provision. This will enable the leadership at Fortismere to judge the impact our new systems have had on the experience of our community and consider our next steps. Please note that we are gathering feedback on our Pastoral Provision from our staff and students at the same time. Please click <u>here</u> to complete the Pastoral Provision Survey Spring 2024.

At the same time we are sharing a link to our Teaching and Learning questionnaire to ask parents and students about their experiences of how we deliver our curriculum. The information obtained from this questionnaire will be used to support our planning to ensure that our taught curriculum meets the needs of our students and gives them all the opportunity to realise their potential. We appreciate this will take time so we are keeping both surveys open until the 5th February for parents to complete them. The information in both surveys will provide a very full view of the quality of the provision at our school and we are asking for this information from both surveys to give us the opportunity to identify our strengths and areas of improvement and and thank you all in advance for sharing your views.

LINC Department

Meet the Team

Continuing our series of staff introductions, this week please meet Venessa Ingerslev who is our English as an Additional Language (EAL) Coordinator.

Why did you want to work in the LINC department? Language learning has always been an enjoyable pursuit for me. I am privileged to be born into a multicultural society and grew up learning no less than three and a half languages (Creole with family and



French, English and German as part of the curriculum at school in France). Later, I took up Danish and Mandarin, while studying in those countries. Now I use English as my primary language in LINC, where I thrive. Grosso modo, my language learning never stopped and right now, I am learning Korean, besides constantly improving my English accent. What is it about acquiring new languages that I can't get enough of? Ironically, words elude me! but there is a certain "je ne sais quoi" about it and it makes me feel happy.

What's the best thing about your job? A sense of accomplishment on repeat! My students illustrate the best things about my job: every new word they master gives me a sense of accomplishment. From successfully memorising vocabulary to understanding grammar rules and forming full sentences, each achievement is akin to going up a level in a game, travelling to a new country or finding a new friend. Successful completion of even the smallest language goals (learn the words for colours in English, write an email to a teacher or their statement for Higher Education) gives a satisfying sense of achievement. It brings me "la joie de vivre"!

What would you like to share with the school community this week? Practise speaking to learn your new language! I have a few strategies to share that can give your language learning a real boost. They can help you develop one of the essential skills for speaking: organising what you already know into sentences so that you can express yourself fluently. Firstly, find a language buddy to communicate with, teaming up with other learners is a great way to get started and gives you plenty of opportunities to try stringing sentences together with empathetic listeners. Secondly, talk about it! A simple way to add a bit of speaking practice to your language learning is to record yourself giving a quick 3 minute summary of something you've just heard or read, I know it is tough "but be careful how you speak" (see Gerard Nolst Trenité's poem The Chaos for irregularities in english pronunciation!). Applying what you've just learned in real speech makes it easier to use in your future conversations; and you can re-listen and correct your mistakes. It can feel a little strange at first, but the more you do it, the easier it gets. Simply set your phone timer to 3 minutes and start talking! Lastly, talk to yourself. The benefits of this are similar to an internal monologue (remember Macbeth), with the added bonus of pronunciation practice. Alternatively, if you've got a pet at home, why not try speaking to your furry friend in the language you are learning. Et voilà! I hope these strategies have left you feeling inspired and ready to get chatting away in English or any other language you are learning.

Supporting SEND & Neurodiversity at Home - Tuesday 23rd January 4.00-5.30pm

The session is aimed at parents/carers of children with SEND but all parents are welcome to attend. The session will focus on neurodiversity in young people and will provide strategies and advice about what parents can do to help, encourage and reinforce from home.
